Physicians have been using BOTOX® since 2011 to treat adults who have overactive bladder caused by a neurologic condition.

INDICATION

BOTOX® (onabotulinumtoxinA) is a prescription medicine that is injected into the bladder muscle and used to treat leakage of urine (incontinence) in adults 18 years and older with overactive bladder due to a neurologic disease when another type of medicine (anticholinergic) does not work well enough or cannot be taken.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

BOTOX may cause serious side effects that can be life threatening. Get medical help right away if you have any of these problems any time (hours to weeks) after injection of BOTOX:

- Problems swallowing, speaking, or breathing, due to weakening of associated muscles, can be severe and result in loss of life. You are at the highest risk if these problems are preexisting before injection. Swallowing problems may last for several months.
- Spread of toxin effects. The effect of botulinum toxin may affect areas away from
 the injection site and cause serious symptoms, including loss of strength and all-over
 muscle weakness; double vision; blurred vision; drooping eyelids; hoarseness or
 change or loss of voice; trouble saying words clearly; loss of bladder control; trouble
 breathing; and trouble swallowing.


IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (continued)

BOTOX may cause loss of strength or general muscle weakness, vision problems, or dizziness within hours to weeks of receiving BOTOX. If this happens, do not drive a car, operate machinery, or do other dangerous activities.

What's causing your OAB?

YOU HAVE A NEUROLOGIC CONDITION

A neurologic condition refers to a disease that affects your body's nervous system. Some neurologic conditions include:



YOUR OAB SYMPTOMS ARE CAUSED BY YOUR NEUROLOGIC CONDITION

- Neurologic conditions can interfere with signals between your brain and bladder
- This causes the bladder muscle to become overactive, which can lead to leakage



YOU'RE NOT ALONE

- About half of people with neurologic conditions like yours have symptoms of OAB
- People like you are frustrated and embarrassed by their OAB. They feel it's just another thing they have to deal with
- The impact of leakage on people like you often gets overlooked by doctors because they are more focused on treating your neurologic condition

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (continued)

Do not receive BOTOX if you are allergic to any of the ingredients in BOTOX (see Medication Guide for ingredients); had an allergic reaction to any other botulinum toxin product such as Myobloc® (rimabotulinumtoxinB), Dysport® (abobotulinumtoxinA), Xeomin® (incobotulinumtoxinA), Jeuveau® (prabotulinumtoxinA-xvfs), Daxxify® (daxibotulinumtoxinA-lanm), or Letybo® (letibotulinumtoxinA-wlbg) (this may not be a complete list of all botulinum toxin products); have a skin infection at the planned injection site.

BOTOX® takes a different approach from other medications

BOTOX® TARGETS OAB AT ITS SOURCE BY BEING PLACED IN THE BLADDER WITHOUT THE NEED FOR SURGERY, WEEKLY DOCTOR VISITS, OR DAILY OAB PILLS*

> In your body, certain chemicals travel from nerve cells to muscle cells to make your bladder contract so that you can urinate

> > BOTOX® is placed directly in the bladder muscle, where it helps block the nerve signals that trigger OAB caused by a neurologic condition

For people who have OAB caused by a neurologic condition, these muscles contract uncontrollably, creating leakage, increased pressure, and decreasing the bladder's ability to hold urine

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (continued)

Do not receive BOTOX for the treatment of urinary incontinence if you have a urinary tract infection (UTI) or cannot empty your bladder on your own and are not routinely catheterizing. Due to the risk of urinary retention (difficulty fully emptying the bladder), only patients who are willing and able to initiate catheterization posttreatment, if required, should be considered for treatment.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (continued)

Adult patients treated for overactive bladder due to a neurologic disease: In clinical trials, 30.6% of adult patients (33/108) who were not using clean intermittent catheterization (CIC) prior to injection required catheterization for urinary retention following treatment with BOTOX 200 Units, as compared to 6.7% of patients (7/104) treated with placebo. The median duration of postinjection catheterization for these patients treated with BOTOX 200 Units (n = 33) was 289 days (minimum 1 day to maximum 530 days), as compared to a median duration of 358 days (minimum 2 days to maximum 379 days) for patients receiving placebo (n = 7).

[†]38% discontinued their OAB medication and did not restart, and 34% stopped and restarted.

Among adult patients not using CIC at baseline, those with multiple sclerosis were more likely to require CIC postinjection than those with spinal cord injury.

The dose of BOTOX is not the same as, or comparable to, another botulinum toxin product.

People who experienced a reduction in leakage episodes

6 WEEKS AFTER TREATMENT WITH BOTOX® IN CLINICAL TRIALS:

≈ 3 in 4 people experienced

50% reduction

≈ 3 in 5 people experienced

75% reduction

≈ 1 in 3 people experienced

Approximately 1 in 3 people reported leakage episodes stopped completely

Limitation: The percentage of patients achieving 50% to 100% reduction in weekly leakage episodes shown above was an additional measure in the primary clinical studies.

These results are based on an analysis of the primary clinical data (reduction in weekly leakage episodes).

No definitive conclusions about the treatment effects with BOTOX $\!\!\!^\circ$ can be drawn from these results.

Serious and/or immediate allergic reactions have been reported, including itching; rash; red, itchy welts; wheezing; asthma symptoms; dizziness; or feeling faint. Get medical help right away if you experience symptoms; further injection of BOTOX should be discontinued.



BOTOX® may positively impact your daily life by significantly reducing leakage episodes

PATIENTS IN BOTOX® CLINICAL TRIALS REPORTED IMPROVEMENT IN THEIR OVERALL QUALITY OF LIFE BASED ON 3 CATEGORIES*:



Avoidance and limiting behavior

Such as overplanning every detail of your day in advance, worrying about where bathrooms are, and limiting how much fluid you drink



Psychosocial impact

Including being preoccupied or frustrated with how your condition impacts your everyday decisions, such as what you can wear, where you can go, and how you feel about your overall well-being



Social embarrassment

For instance, being embarrassed or worried that your symptoms might be noticed by others

*These improvements were reported using the Incontinence Quality of Life (I-Q0L) questionnaire. This is a validated questionnaire that is used to measure the impact of urinary incontinence on a patient's quality of life.

Tell your doctor about all your muscle or nerve conditions, such as ALS or Lou Gehrig's disease, myasthenia gravis, or Lambert-Eaton syndrome, as you may be at increased risk of serious side effects, including difficulty swallowing and difficulty breathing from typical doses of BOTOX.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (continued)

Tell your doctor if you have any breathing-related problems. Your doctor may monitor you for breathing problems during treatment with BOTOX for detrusor overactivity associated with a neurologic condition. The risk of developing lung disease in patients with reduced lung function is increased in patients receiving BOTOX.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (continued)

Autonomic dysreflexia in patients treated for overactive bladder due to a neurologic disease. Autonomic dysreflexia associated with intradetrusor injections of BOTOX could occur in patients treated for detrusor overactivity associated with a neurologic condition and may require prompt medical therapy. In clinical trials, the incidence of autonomic dysreflexia was greater in adult patients treated with BOTOX 200 Units compared with placebo (1.5% versus 0.4%, respectively).

Tell your doctor about all your medical conditions, including if you have or have had bleeding problems; have plans to have surgery; had surgery on your face;

have weakness of forehead muscles, trouble raising your eyebrows, drooping eyelids, and any other abnormal facial change; have symptoms of a UTI and are being treated for urinary incontinence (symptoms of a UTI may include pain or burning with urination, frequent urination, or fever); have problems emptying your bladder on your own and are being treated for urinary incontinence; are pregnant or plan to become pregnant (it is not known if BOTOX can harm your unborn baby); are breastfeeding or plan to (it is not known if BOTOX passes into breast milk).

Tell your doctor about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Using BOTOX with certain other medicines may cause serious side effects. Do not start any new medicines until you have told your doctor that you have received BOTOX in the past.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (continued)

Tell your doctor if you received any other botulinum toxin product in the last 4 months; have received injections of botulinum toxin such as Myobloc®, Dysport®, Xeomin®, Jeuveau®, Daxxify®, or Letybo® in the past (this may not be a complete list of all botulinum toxin products; tell your doctor exactly which product you received); have recently received an antibiotic by injection; take muscle relaxants; take an allergy or cold medicine; take a sleep medicine; take aspirin-like products or blood thinners.

^{*}In clinical trials, 6 weeks after treatment, people treated with BOTOX® had an average of \approx 20 fewer leakage episodes per week (or \approx 2.8 per day) compared to 11 fewer leakage episodes per week (or \approx 1.5 per day) with placebo. In clinical studies, results were measured at 2, 6, and 12 weeks, with 6 weeks being the primary time point.

Other side effects of BOTOX include dry mouth; discomfort or pain at the injection site; tiredness; headache; neck pain; eye problems such as double vision, blurred vision, decreased eyesight, drooping eyelids, swelling of your eyelids, and dry eyes; drooping eyebrows; and upper respiratory tract infection. In adults being treated for urinary incontinence, other side effects include UTI and painful urination. In patients being treated for urinary incontinence, another side effect includes the inability to
